Putting action to prayer

A reflection by (The Rt. Rev.) Kenneth L. Price, Jr Bishop in the Diocese of Southern Ohio

The recent attack on our nation's capitol has shaken us all. Regardless of our politics, the scenes of violence and assault are deeply disturbing. In a democracy, the right of people to protest decisions they do not agree with is important. What we saw this past week in Washington was not a peaceful protest, but a violent act of lawlessness. There are many things that led up to that event, but the end result was the endangering of our duly elected officials and their staffs as they went about their constitutional business of certifying the election of our next President. It resulted in needless destruction of property, physical injury and even death of people caught up in the melee. The message of protest got lost in the violence that ensued.

Combine this with all too-frequent instances of racial injustice (also often leading to death) that are sweeping our country and the tension and fear brought on by the pandemic of COVID-19, and humanity is being put to a test unlike we have known in our lifetime.

People of faith are being asked to pray for our nation, our leaders and for those directly affected by these events. This is good. I believe in prayer and encourage it. However, I also believe that prayer is not complete unless it is coupled with action. Prayer is always meant to be God-centered. When God is at the center of our life, self cannot dominate. On the other hand, when self is at the center, God is squeezed out.

I believe that is what happened in Washington. As human beings and citizens in a free democracy, we often have opinions and beliefs that are in opposition. Debate over those opinions is healthy. Our Congress was about to embark on just that kind of debate when it was attacked. When debate devolves into a demand that my way is the only way and we discount not only the other's beliefs, but that individual as a person, then self-centeredness replaces God-centeredness and prayer becomes hollow.

Sadly, all too often when asked to pray, we allow the recitation of the prayers to be the end. But remember, I said prayer without action is incomplete. As we all pray this Sunday and in the days to come, may we resolve to make sure our life is a living testimony to those prayers. Instead of only listening to those who agree with us and discounting those who do not, let's make a point of trying to see and understand both sides of an issue. We then can debate the merits of that issue, and not turn our differences of opinion into personal attacks. Let us not only pray for racial justice, but when we witness instances of injustice, speak up and offer support to those who have been victimized. And concerning the virus, let us listen to our medical experts and even if we might not fully understand or believe in maskwearing and vaccination, not make that a political matter but participate for the greater good of all the community so that we may eradicate this attack on us all.

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Bishop Price's Message, continued

When I was younger, at church camp we all made bracelets that said "What would God have us to do?" I no longer wear that bracelet, but its message is so emblazoned in my heart that I hear it in everything I do.

And so, my sisters and brothers, pray with me this Sunday the following prayers. But then ask God to show you what you may do to give action to the praying. May God bless you in the doing to God's work.

Following the example of our Presiding Bishop, I ask that all of our congregations have special prayers this Sunday for peace in our nation. Drawing from our book of Common Prayer, these are the prayers Presiding Bishop Curry recommends:

Save your people, Lord, and bless your inheritance;
Govern and uphold us now and always.

Day by day we bless you; We praise your name forever.

Lord, keep us from sin today; Have mercy on us, Lord, have mercy.

Lord, show us your love and mercy; For we put our trust in you.

In you, Lord, is our hope; And we shall never hope in vain.

Let us pray:

Eternal God, in whose perfect kingdom no sword is drawn but the sword of righteousness, no strength known but the strength of love: So mightily spread abroad your Spirit, that all peoples may be gathered together under the banner of the Prince of Peace, as children of one God and Creator of us all; to whom be dominion and glory, now and forever.



O God, by the leading of a star you manifested your only Son to the peoples of the earth: Lead us, who know you now by faith, to your presence, where we may see your glory face to face; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen. (Collect for Epiphany, BCP, pg. 214)

On January 6 we celebrated the Feast of the Epiphany, the visit of the magi to the Christ child in Bethlehem. Tradition has it that three wise kings followed a star to find the new king of the Jews. When they found Jesus, they gave him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. If I had been Jesus' parent, I would have wondered at those gifts. Gold, I could put to good use, but frankincense and myrrh seem a bit on the odd side.

We celebrated the Feast of Epiphany with Star Gifts. Each person on our mailing list received a star with a word written on it. The word is a gift to be carried and prayed about for the coming year. Some of the words will seem immediately applicable – a musician who receives the word "harmony" will see the significance right away. But what about the shy introvert who receives the word "evangelism" or the politician who receives the word "humility"? They may think those gifts are odd and were surely intended for someone else.

But we, like Mary, are being invited to "ponder these words in [our] hearts". As part of our daily prayers throughout 2021, we can take the challenge of the word which has been gifted to us. We can play with the implications of the word in our lives. It may present a challenge to the way we have always seen ourselves. It may open up new possibilities to us. All of the words point to gifts that God has given to us, gifts that offer opportunities to shine our light in new and creative ways.

African Bible Study Wednesday at 7 PM

What is African Bible Study? The approach used is sometimes called African Bible Study, which refers to the method's origins. It is a very structured, very disciplined, and very meditative approach to learning from scripture. It not only discourages but prevents crosstalk and intellectualizing on a reading. It instead encourages listening to others and ourselves as opposed to talking as a group.

THE FORMAT

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life,

which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

Procedure:

- 1. One person reads passage slowly.
- 2. Each person identifies the word or phrase that catches their attention. (1 minute)
- 3. Each shares the word or phrase with the group. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation, if possible.)
- 5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today. (1 minute)
- 6. Each shares. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation, if possible.)
- 8. Each person names or writes: "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
- 9. Each shares their answer. (5-10 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
- 10. Each prays for the person on their right, naming what was shared in other steps. (5 minutes)

Closing: The Lord's Prayer
