Experiencing Lent as a Community, and as an Individual

This Lent, I launched a sermon series on institutional sin. Also known as collective sin or corporate sin (or – in Augustinian terms, concupiscence), institutional sin refers to the ways in which the way our life is organized keep us from God. In some ways, decisions made long before we were born limit our choices today, and keep us from the realm that God had imagined for us. For those of us who normally think of sin as something an individual does, this might be

something an individual does, this might be quite a change. It sees sin as something that happens in community, and something that therefore affects a community. For some, it may seem as if this ducks the problem – blaming society for what one person does. For others, it may seem depressing: knowing that God has something beautiful in mind for us, which we cannot attain in this world, because of things seemingly beyond our control. But, I imagine (I hope) it is reassuring as well: sometimes, when we struggle to see good in the world, or to do the work of God, it helps to understand the reasons why we struggle. If it seems like we are swimming upstream to return to God's perfection, it's because in many ways, we are. But, if I've been focusing on society throughout most of Lent. I'd like us to focus a bit more on the individual during Holy Week, and how God is present with each of us.

Palm Sunday on some level serves as the perfect pivot from our observance of Lent, to Holy Week. As we celebrate Jesus's triumphal entry into Jerusalem, let us focus a minute on what it felt like to be in the crowd. The crowd that celebrated, but also turned. Let remember those times when we have been swept away – whether in moments of joy, or of anger. Palm Sunday invites us to find ourselves as individuals, in the midst of a mob. It brings us back, to remember that while sin might affect all of society, God reveals Godself to each of us, individually. God seeks a unique relationship with each of us. On Maundy Thursday, as we gather to remember the Last Supper, let us remember that Jesus invited each person to the table, knowing exactly who they were. Jesus knew he would be betraved and denied. And vet, Jesus dined with all the disciples. More significantly, Jesus insisted on bathing their care-worn, calloused feet. Maundy Thursday invites us to show our most vulnerable selves to Jesus. On Good Friday, we recount the story of the crucifixion. Let us remember that Jesus didn't have to be crucified. But Jesus submitted to the most degrading type of punishment, to show that nothing could separate us from God, and that God could be present in even the most horrific moments. Good Friday invites us to see God in the midst of the worst of humanity. in the places we find grace most unimaginable. It reminds us that Jesus forgives the seemingly unforgiveable, and will forgive us, too. And, of course, there is Easter: the day of celebration and rejoicing. Without the emotions of Holy Week before, Easter pales in significance. But, for those who have walked through Lent and Holy Week, Easter is a most special remembrance that God can truly bring good out of horror – whether that's the horror of social sin, or of individual emotion, vulnerability, or suffering. At Easter, we celebrate as a community. We celebrate Jesus's triumph as an individual over those things that we fear most, and those evils that lurk in the worst of society.

Easter comes at the very end of March this year. Lent and Holy Week help to prepare us, to remind us why it is the greatest celebration of all – for us as individuals, and our communities, too.

Each month this column will highlight a different ministry in hopes that we can assist parishioners in becoming more familiar with the ministries that Christ Church supports.

Habitat for Humanity

Since 1976, Habitat for Humanity has brought people together nationally to help build homes for people who would not otherwise be able to afford home ownership. The Clark County branch of Habitat is part of Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton which serves Montgomery, Greene, and Clark Counties. Currently, Clark County Habitat is working on finishing two homes in New Carlisle. They still have a ways to go to finish the insides, but they are hoping that volunteers will be able to complete the homes this Spring. Because housing is a significant crisis, Habitat's work is more important than ever. Habitat offers several ways to support their organization:

- FLEX YOUR MUSCLES! Those interested in helping with physical labor can contribute to the construction and finishing work of the actual structures.
- SHOP! The ReStore, located at 2990 Derr Road and open Monday-Saturday, offers everything from cabinets to toilets to home décor.
- DONATE! The ReStore also takes donations of gently used major household items (check with them to make sure they can take your donation).
- FILL A BANK! Christ Church parishioners will have the opportunity to fill Habitat banks during the month of March to financially support the organization. This can be spare change or bills of any denomination. Anyone wishing to participate in this project can pick up a bank at the east entrance or see Linda Mortensen after the 10 AM service.

One of Habitat's staff recently mentioned that the support that Clark County has received from Christ Church over the years has been a huge encouragement to their team!
