On Home Communion

First, the big announcement: Christ Episcopal Church has commissioned Eucharistic Visitors again! Once fully licensed, these two teams – Jack and Dawn Ivy, and Keith and Susan Doubt – will be making regular visits to members of the parish who are unable to attend church on Sunday mornings. I'm happy that they will be taking part in this important ministry.

But it's important to consider why this ministry is so important, and what it is really all about. And, I suppose, what it is not about.

At the risk of stating the obvious, Lay Eucharistic Visitors (LEVs) visit. They are licensed by the Diocese (and supervised by their clergy or other pastoral body) to personally call on members of the parish. On a merely practical level, they add a great deal to the efforts of the clergy and the pastoral care team, who offer support and companionship to those who cannot come to church.

But a Eucharistic Visit offers more than that. The visit is meant to be an extension of the Sunday worship service. Indeed, in the Early Church (the Church in the first few centuries after Christ), people would go to worship, and then immediately take what was left to share with families who could not attend. In a way, the service didn't end until the last people had been visited.

We recreate that idea, a bit, in church. When we send people out, we do so immediately after all of us at church have had a chance to have Communion. We use the wafers and wine that were consecrated at that service. The Eucharistic Visitors will usually also bring with them a bulletin from that particular service, and during their visit, they will likely talk a bit about the readings and other things that happened in church that day. It's meant to bring the experience of church to those who cannot attend.

Equally importantly, Eucharistic Visitors embody the fact that we are a community at prayer. Those who cannot be with us physically are still a part of our community. Visits from Lay Eucharistic Visitors embody that – members of the congregation praying together on Sunday and partaking of the sacraments, just in a place that's not church. These visits just feel different than a visit from the priest, and they're supposed to.



I should also point out that visits from LEVs are not meant to replace visits from clergy; as I noted, they are different. I will still be visiting people as well. In part, this is because there are sacramental acts that priests offer (absolution, blessing, "last rites") that lay people cannot. More importantly, I feel it is important for any clergy person to maintain a connection with all the members of the congregation. But I also believe it's important for every member to feel that they remain a part of the congregation, even if they cannot come to church in person. LEVs help make that connection.

Since I've been ordained, I've noticed that sometimes, when I call to set up a visit with someone who cannot come to church, they hesitate. It's not a good time, they say, or the house is a mess. But, Eucharistic Visits (and clergy visits) are not meant to be social calls. They are meant to share the love of God. God understands messes. And so do priests and LEVs.

Long before I was ordained, I served as a LEV. (Back then, they were called Pastoral Visiting Lay Eucharistic Ministers, or PVLEMs, which did not exactly roll off the tongue.) It was at times a very difficult ministry. But I have some very happy memories as well. For example, I remember visiting a fellow choir member who was on complete bedrest due to a difficult pregnancy. I have fond memories of bringing her communion, with her toddler daughter joining us and babbling throughout our visit (yes, she received Communion, too). But my favorite memory is from my last month or two of being at that parish—the parish I had attended throughout most of my PhD program. When I finally defended my dissertation, they all offered their congratulations. One man even offered to take me to lunch to celebrate. I didn't know him very well, so I held off on accepting. Shortly before I was about to move away for my first teaching job, he had a massive heart attack. My rector was about to leave on vacation, but I asked if I could bring him Communion that Sunday.

She agreed. I found a few of his friends from church, and we all trouped to the hospital. We found him, alone – a man who had usually seemed robust and healthy looked a bit lost, and pale (for an Afro-Caribbean man, this was startling). There was a look of surprise and joy in his eyes as we knocked on his door. We said hello, and asked how he was doing. We chatted about church, read the lessons, reviewed the sermon, said the prayers. We shared the bread and wine and the love of God. We embodied the prayers of everyone who had been at church that day and prayed for his recovery.

We stayed much longer than we should have. He was exhausted and weak, but he didn't want to say goodbye. But we knew we had to go. At the door, I told him, "I may not be able to take you up on your offer of lunch, but I think this meal was better."

Eucharistic Visitors offer holy meals and comfort. I am delighted that we will once again have Eucharistic Visitors ministering in our parish.
