We Shall be Changed


How the pandemic and racial reckoning will change the Church

Our world has been rocked over the last year by not one, but two pandemics – Covid-19 and the deep roots of racism in our nation. As more and more people are vaccinated and the number of Covid cases declines, mandated masks and social distance restrictions are being relaxed. At the same time, police killings of Black citizens, efforts to tighten restrictions on voting access, and deeply rooted economic injustice continue to haunt us.

We long for things to calm down and return to “normal”. We long for the “way things were”. But what have we learned that can enhance our “new normal”? How can we preserve some of the positive lessons we have learned from this period of social isolation and build upon them? And how can our ministries respond to the racial and economic realities of our community and world in new, creative, and life changing ways?

Bishop Mark Edington asked similar questions and sought responses from thoughtful leaders in the Church in the book, *We Shall be Changed: Questions for the Post-Pandemic Church*. He describes this past year as having the breath taken away from us – the breath in our lungs from illness and the breath of our lives by the racial violence in our nation. He states, “This moment of pandemic has....made our moment one of unparalleled urgency for the Christian message; for it is only the victory of the Cross over death and the grave that can finally liberate us from constructing inequalities and supremacies that seek the false promise of protection from fears already defeated....Will we, or will we not, proclaim that message not just in words but in actions, not just in declarations but in decisions?”

PRAYER MINISTRY

Praying for Our Needs and the Needs of Others

Daily prayer is central to our spiritual lives. We give thanks and adoration to God, we ask for forgiveness and guidance, we offer our lives to God, and we lift up our needs and the needs of others for healing. Our prayers can be as simple of inviting God’s presence into our consciousness or as specific as asking for the healing of a particular person facing a particular challenge.

One of the primary gifts of community is the offering of prayers for other people in our circle and on behalf of their loved ones. Every week in the Prayers of the People a list of names is lifted to God for healing. At other times a small group on a parish prayer chain gets news of people in special need of prayer. The names of those on our prayer lists are not always familiar to us. We often do not know the circumstances behind the prayer requests. But that does not matter. We don’t need to know the person – God already does. We don’t need to know why we are praying – God already knows. All we need to know is that God is listening and caring for and responding to the needs of all God’s children.

Only the names, and occasionally the relationship to a parishioner, will be shared in church and through the prayer chain. If an individual wishes to share details, it is that person’s choice to do so on a one-to-one basis. Otherwise, privacy is preserved.

The ministry of prayer is the sacred calling of all Christian. We are to make time each day to respond to God in thought and action, with or without words, lifting the needs and joys of our lives as they intersect with the wider community and world. 1. A few minutes before 9:00 AM, call **312-626-6799**. A recording will answer, saying "Welcome to Zoom!"
2. It will ask you to enter your Meeting ID, followed by #. That's **841 1414 5583#**
3. When asked for your Participant ID Number press #
4. When asked for your password, enter **712122#** Now you'll be able to hear our worship!

NOTE: if you don't hear anything right away, don't panic. Sometimes we run a few minutes late, so just hang on and trust that we'll begin as soon as we can.

African Bible Study Wednesday at 7 PM

African Bible Study meets each Wednesday via Google Meet. To join, share your interest and send your email address to Keith Doubt at kdoubt@gmail.com. Ten minutes before the meeting, Keith will send an email invitation to the group. Click on the link, and you'll be in!

What is African Bible Study? The approach used is sometimes called African Bible Study, which refers to the method's origins. It is a very structured, very disciplined, and very meditative approach to learning from scripture. It not only discourages but prevents crosstalk and intellectualizing on a reading. It instead encourages listening to others and ourselves as opposed to talking as a group.

THE FORMAT

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life,

which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

Procedure:

1. One person reads passage slowly.
2. Each person identifies the word or phrase that catches their attention. (1 minute)
3. Each shares the word or phrase with the group. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation, if possible.)
5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today. (1 minute)
6. Each shares. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation, if possible.)
8. Each person names or writes: "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
9. Each shares their answer. (5-10 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
10. Each prays for the person on their right, naming what was shared in other steps. (5 minutes)

Closing: The Lord's Prayer

Food Pantry Dates June 16th and July 21st

Volunteers are needed before and on drive through pantry days to help unload food, pack food, and provide customer service. No matter your level of comfort with in-person contact, there is a volunteer opportunity that's right for you!

Volunteer to help PRIOR to Pantry Day

Currently, food pantry groceries are being pre-bagged so that on pantry distribution day, filled bags can be placed into client's cars. This has created an opportunity for you to volunteer as a pantry helper with little to no contact with other individuals. It is also an opportunity for your family or "pod" to volunteer bagging groceries. Ann Chitkara will arrange for either you or your pod to be the only group working on the project at one time.

A glimpse of the work involved: as soon as all the groceries are unloaded onto tables in the parish hall, you would go around the tables loading specific items into bags and placing the bags on specified pallets or tables where they will sit until pantry distribution day. The work also involves clearing out and breaking down cardboard shipping boxes. We are currently seeking packing volunteers for July and August.

Please look at your calendar. If you and or your pod are willing to commit to a block of 3-4 hours on either **June 10th and 11th, and/or July 15th and 16th**, let Ann know. Together you can arrange a time when Ann will meet you at the Church and provide specific directions. Ideally, all the groceries should be bagged for distribution by **June 16th and July 21st**.

Volunteer to help ON to Pantry Day


June: The Drive thru Food Pantry will be on **June 16th starting at 11 AM**. Volunteers are needed to help unload food, pack food, and help with customer service.
