# Lessons from an Old Wrought-Iron Fence

A few weeks ago, a pickup truck hit the fence that separates Christ Church property from the sidewalk. The truck hit the fence on a diagonal, and with considerable force, taking out stretches of fencing on both High Street and Linden, and in some cases, carrying those pieces all the way across Linden until it stopped.



We are committed to replacing the fence, and as much as possible, making sure the repair work matches the historic fence. As you can imagine, that's not easy. As they say, "They don't make 'em like that anymore." Walking along the fence with Jeff Spradlin from Spradlin Brothers Welding, along with our wardens, showed how true that was. The fence is likely over a century old, made from solid iron, twisted into its decorative shape, reinforced and supported from behind. When it was installed, large rocks were dug into the soil. To place the fence, people drilled holes into the rocks, stuck the fence posts in, and then poured hot metal into the hole to fix the post in place. It was meant to last forever.

Likewise, the Episcopal tradition is meant to remain sturdy, no matter what may come. That tradition, expressed in the Creeds and a particular worship style, has deep roots. The Creeds, of course,

date from the second and fourth centuries. But our worship style is also ancient. Some our Eucharistic prayers have elements of liturgies written in the first centuries after Christ.



Just as our fence was supported by visible posts along the street and some reinforcements that leaned behind, our worship style rests on both Word and Sacrament. In other words, most Sundays we can lean on the reminders of God's love found both in the Bible and Communion. We read through a cycle of Bible readings over three years to ensure that we hear most of the history of God's people, but the Eucharistic prayers, the bread, and the wine remind us that God is also with us in the here and now. The two support our faith in different ways; both are present every Sunday.

I wonder what people thought of our fence. Did they see it as a quaint historic artifact, part of being in the Historic District? Or did they see it as a barrier, something to keep outsiders from entering? Or, to keep the faithful of Christ Church from wandering away? Likewise, I know that our tradition can spark reactions. Some find our Creed or elaborate liturgy confusing, or off putting. Others see it simply as an irrelevant historical artifact, not really relevant today. Yet, I firmly believe that our worship style and Creeds – when properly understood – can be profoundly beautiful, but also prevent real psychic and spiritual harm. Just as our old fence was beautiful, and, in its own way, protective. Think of how much more serious the accident might have been if the truck had not hit our fence but instead had barreled straight into our building instead! Thanks to our fence, the driver and his passenger could walk away from the accident.

It will be interesting to see what develops. I imagine that when the truck driver's insurance company admitted they were liable, they did not realize what they might need to pay. I fear that they may try to convince us to simply replace our historic fence with the type of imitation plastic fencing available at hardware stores. That type of fencing can serve many purposes. But it is not the same. Similarly, there are a lot of different Christian traditions, and now, a number of more modern nondenominational worship centers. All can serve a variety of needs and provide help and assistance. But your wardens and I are committed to our history and tradition – in fences and in faith.

## Baptisms Scheduled for Nov. 3rd

The next opportunity for children and adults to be baptized at Christ Church will be Sunday, November 3rd, which is the Sunday after All Saints' Day. This is one of four specific days set aside for baptisms according to the *Book of Common Prayer*. Holy Baptism is one of the two great sacraments of the Gospel, given by Christ to his Church (along with the Holy Eucharist).

### **Have You Met Yet???**

## Linda Gatten Butler, MSW, ACSW, LISW-S

As one of the few baby boomers who *grew up in Springfield and stayed*, I am proud to have attended Highlands Elementary, Hayward Junior High, and South High School (GO WILDCATS!) My father worked at the *News and Sun* newspaper, while my mother worked for Rotary Club and was President of the League of Women Voters. After her passing in April 2024, the newspaper featured her on Mother's Day as a leader, activist, and progressive.

My younger sister and I attended Central Methodist Church with our active parents. I was involved with Methodist Youth Fellowship, choir, and bell choir (that was where all the cute boys from other schools attended, too!)

In 1965 my father, Jim Gatten, wrote a series of articles about racism in Springfield that won an Associated Press Award. He was a "voice for people of color" and our family suffered consequences such as having a cross burned in our front yard, being ostracized by the community, losing his job and being "dismissed" by our church. My father's truth, stories, and courage strongly impacted our family and our community.

After that experience, I became disenchanted with churches. I started college at Ohio University (GO BOBCATS!). I graduated with degrees in Sociology and Social Work. While working in mental health services, I enrolled in THE Ohio State University (GO BUCKS!). My Social Work Masters focused on Planning and Administration. I remember meeting with my Practice Class professor to share that I was commuting to Columbus from Springfield, working part-time in mental health, AND asking his understanding that I might be late for class since my patients came first. He responded,

"I've heard about you, and you're going to be a hell of a social worker!

Actually, in 2014 I was awarded "Social Worker of the Year" for this 7-county area! Familiar with the region and the missions of nonprofits, I worked with strong teams to create four local nonprofits [Rocking Horse Center, Child Advocacy Center, Grant Professional Association of the Miami Valley (the longest standing chapter in the country) and Association of Fundraising Professionals, the 9<sup>th</sup> chapter in Ohio].

After 50 years of social work service (including forming my own business—Butler Consulting) with over 250 nonprofits nationwide, I retired in 2022. Retirement is awesome with biking, gardening (I became a Master Gardener in 2018), serving on many nonprofit boards (including the National Grant Professional Association), singing (in the Springfield Chorale and churches), and traveling (we are traveling to Japan in September to celebrate our 52<sup>nd</sup> wedding anniversary). My husband, Rick Butler, was the principal at South and retired in 2015. Our daughter, Jessica, has her PhD in Sociology, teaches at Mills College in California and lives in Berkley with her partner, Isaac, an astrophysicist.
