Where is God in times of uncertainty?

“Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Have no anxiety about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God. And the peace of God, which passes all understanding, will keep your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus.”

Philippians 4:4, 6-7

St. Paul wrote these words to the church in Philippi as he sat in prison. “Rejoice!” “Have no anxiety!” From prison, Paul gave thanks to God and claimed Christ’s peace as his own.

We are at the end of a very contentious election season and may not know who our next president is for some time. We continue to live in the midst of an unpredictable pandemic. And Christ Church is in yet another transition process.

Opportunities abound for high anxiety. Yet we hear Paul’s hope for us as followers of Christ – rejoice, pray with thanksgiving, feel the peace of God as we keep the Christ in our hearts and minds.

Easier to say than to do, right? So, what *are* we to do? How do we move forward when anxiety is high and the future is uncertain?

PRAY. “With *thanksgiving* let your requests be made known to God.” I know that I have a different experience of prayer if I begin my prayers with thanksgiving. When I go directly to what I want for myself, for others, for the world, I tend to get stuck there. My complaining takes over and I forget to say, “thank you”. Or my thanks becomes an obligatory tag line at the end of my long list of grievances. On the other hand, when I begin with thanking God, I acknowledge that God is in charge, that God’s

compassion and mercy far exceed any of my hopes or expectations.

LISTEN. Prayer is a two-way street. We talk, God listens, then we need to listen in return. Answers don’t always come quickly to our prayers, but they always come if we have open hearts and open minds to receive even the most unexpected, and sometimes, unwelcome answers. We must allow the Holy Spirit to lead where God intends.

Remember the **BAPTISMAL COVENANT**. In Baptism we promise to “continue in the apostles’ teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers”. We also promise to resist evil, seek and serve Christ in all persons, love our neighbors as ourselves, strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being. In other words, we promise to be the Church through worshipping together and moving into the world in Christ’s Name. Unfortunately, God doesn’t make the promise that living the baptismal covenant will be easy or straight forward. And God definitely doesn’t agree to play by our rules or follow our dictates. That’s the work of the Holy Spirit, which leads us back to prayer and reflection on Gods’ Word.

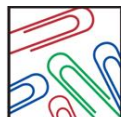

FOLLOW JESUS. Jesus restored people to spiritual and physical health. We can, each in our own ways, extend that healing to others. And we can, as a community of faith, begin healing from the loss of beloved clergy, from the differing views of what we desire for the future of Christ Church, and from disruption the pandemic has caused in our communal life. That will require honesty and truth-telling. Even if that hurts in the short term, it is critical in our movement into whatever future God imagines for Christ Church. Jesus was not afraid of conflict. "Get behind me Satan!" he chastised Peter just before he proclaimed Peter the rock upon which the Church would be founded. And Jesus said repeatedly, "Do not be afraid," echoed by Paul in his teaching on anxiety.

Where is God in the midst of the anxiety that grips so many of us? God is with us in that anxiety, the source of a peace that passes all understanding. If we pray and listen. If we remember who we are as Christians. If we follow Jesus.

African Bible Study Tuesday at 7 PM

African Bible Study will meet each Tuesday evening using Google Meet, which is similar to Zoom. Each week's passage will be chosen from a set of recommended readings connected with the stewardship theme of Faith-Filled Generosity. These theme-related readings will continue through the remainder of Pentecost, and wind up the week preceding Christ the King Sunday (Nov. 22).

What is African Bible Study? The approach we will be using is sometimes called African Bible Study, which refers to the origins of this method of Bible study. What is it then? This small group Bible study is a very structured, very disciplined, and very meditative approach to learning from scripture. It not only discourages but prevents crosstalk and intellectualizing on a reading. It instead encourages listening to others and ourselves as opposed to talking at a group. The Diocese recommends this approach to Bible study for the small groups that churches are asked to organize this fall around the theme of stewardship.

THE FORMAT

Opening Prayer: O Blessed Lord, who caused all Holy Scripture to be written for our learning: Grant us so to hear them, read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest them, that we may embrace and hold fast the blessed hope of everlasting life, which you have given us in our savior Jesus Christ, Amen.

Procedure:

1. One person reads passage slowly.
2. Each person identifies the word or phrase that catches their attention. (1 minute)
3. Each shares the word or phrase with the group. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
4. Another person reads the passage slowly (from a different translation, if possible.)
5. Each person identifies where this passage touches their life today. (1 minute)
6. Each shares. (3-5 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
7. Passage is read a third time (another reader and translation, if possible.)
8. Each person names or writes: "From what I've heard and shared, what do I believe God wants me to do or be? Is God inviting me to change in any way?" (5 minutes)
9. Each shares their answer. (5-10 minutes, NO DISCUSSION)
10. Each prays for the person on their right, naming what was shared in other steps. (5 minutes)

Closing: The Lord's Pray



NOVEMBER

Consumerism can prevent us from noticing needs, writes Walter Brueggemann (*The Prophetic Imagination*). A culture steeped in materialism and greed can "block out the cries of the denied ones ... so that no one discerns misery alive in the heart of God."

In November, we celebrate Thanksgiving, Christ the King Sunday, and the start of Advent. What does it mean that Christ is our King? How can we truly give God thanks and prepare for Jesus' coming? It's a good time to ponder what hurts God's heart — and how we can help.

If someone is lonely, perhaps we can reach out with a card or phone call. If we sense inequality saddening God, we might advocate for fair policies. If God is in pain because some of his children have too little, we can share our resources. In so doing, we welcome Christ the King among us, and give him meaningful thanks.

Calling in Via Telephone for Worship Audio

Here are the instructions for calling in via telephone if you'd like to listen to the audio of our online worship services on Sunday mornings.

Here's what you need to do:

1. A few minutes before 9:00 AM on Sunday, call **1-312-626-6799**.
2. A recording will answer, saying "Welcome to Zoom!"
3. It will ask you to enter your Meeting ID, followed by #. That's **841 1414 5583#**
4. Then it will ask for your Participant ID Number—but you don't have one! So just press #
5. Finally, it will ask you to enter the Password, followed by #. That's **712122#**
6. Now you will be able to hear our worship!

A special note: if you don't hear anything right away, don't panic. Sometimes we run a few minutes behind schedule due to various technical issues -- so just hang in there, and trust that we'll begin as soon as we can.
