The 2024 Annual Meeting will be held at 9:00 between services on Sunday, February 25th in the Parish Hall. All members aged 16 and older are asked to be present for this once-a-year meeting. Who can vote? According to the Canons of the Episcopal Church, voting members are those who are: members of Christ Church and at least 16 years old, regular in worship, faithful in giving, and active in Parish ministry.

At the meeting, we'll be electing two at-large Vestry members to 3-year terms, as well as four delegates to represent Christ Church as the fall Diocesan Convention. The 150th Annual Convention will return to a two-day format. It will be held Nov. 22–23 at the Roberts Centre in Wilmington, OH.

The Nominating Committee members are Kay Koeninger, Linda Mortensen, Brian Shelburne, Liz Wheeler, Denise Sharp, and ex officio, The Rev. Dr. Michelle Boomgaard.

# On Ash Valentine's Wednesday

For the last few weeks, I have been lamenting the fact that Ash Wednesday falls on February 14 this year – Valentine's Day. I have also been joking a bit, about what an Ash Wednesday date might look like. I've been inspired – if that's the right word – by a series of "Puritan Valentine's Cards" that have been doing the rounds on Facebook for about a decade now. Sepia-toned pictures, many with antique-looking art, like a bouquet of flowers. Around the picture, the words, "Roses are red, violets are blue, and neither is useful or necessary at all."

The joke being that the austere Puritans would not have appreciated the sentimentality of our modern Valentine's Day at all. And, of course, in my mind, Ash Wednesday meant austerity.

There are good reasons for this, of course. For a long time, Lent was associated with penance, the idea that we should do something unpleasant to show we were sorry for our sins. Giving up chocolate or chewing gum. And since Ash Wednesday kicks off Lent, it is naturally the day when those penitential acts are at their most noticeable, and raw. It seems like I never crave meat normally, except on those years when I partially abstain from it on days like Ash Wednesday.

Nowadays, the Church often promotes a different view of Lent. Instead of "giving things up" for Lent (pleasant things, like television, or sweets), we often talk about "taking things on." The idea is that we choose something to do that will help us draw near to God. A new habit that we will keep for the season, like giving to

charity, or giving thanks for one new thing every day.

The problem, of course, is that "taking things on" still sounds like a chore. It still makes things sound as unpleasant as those Puritan Valentines cards. It turns what is supposed to be a delight into a drudge. Like the card that says, "I need you ... to help raise livestock and crops or surely we will starve to death this winter."

But maybe, Valentine's Day is the perfect metaphor for Ash Wednesday, after all. Because, when you think about it, Valentine's is about spending time to focus on a relationship with the one you love. It's about giving up some things – money and time (some of the most highly valued commodities we have) to show you care. Ideally, time spent during Valentine's should be spent exclusively with the other person – not playing on a cell phone or staring at the television.

On some level, the same is true for Lent -a season of the year we spend working on our relationship with God. Because, let's face it, that is a relationship that can easily be taken for granted.

Ideally, if we give something up, like watching television or playing mindless games on our phones, it's so we can be more present in the moment – present to God, and to the blessings and people God has put in our lives. And, if we take something on, such as giving alms or saying a prayer or doing devotional reading, it's so that we can spend more time with God or with those God has called us to love.

Any relationship – whether it is with children, or a spouse or sweetheart, or with God – any relationship requires attention and care. What better time to remember that than this year, on Ash Valentine's Wednesday?


Here's how to watch our services on YouTube: Open the YouTube app on your smart TV.

Each month Christ Church will highlight a different ministry in hopes that we can assist parishioners in becoming more familiar with the ministries that Christ Church supports.

### **Her Story**

Her Story (with whom Safe Harbor recently merged) is a nonprofit that focuses on assisting women who have experienced significant trauma and have developed addictions to cover over the pain of the trauma. Licensed Her Story staff provides safe housing with three different levels of programing, case management services, licensed trauma therapy, intensive outpatient treatment for addiction, nursing services, connection to healthy role models, and connection to the love of Christ. Women often experience the first unconditional love and acceptance that they have ever felt and are encouraged to stick with the process because of this very thing.

Her Story is having its annual fundraiser on March 2nd at 11 AM at Grace Evangelical Lutheran Church, and Christ Church is sponsoring the event. We have set a goal of sending 8–12 people from our congregation to learn more about the valuable work of the ministry and to enjoy connecting in ways that might support the ministry practically and financially. ## Exciting Ways to Help our New(er) Neighbors! "How to Succeed in Springfield"

Anyone who's moved recently knows that there are lots of little things you need to do before you are truly "settled." Things like getting an ID, opening a bank account, or registering for school. I know from personal experience that things can be very different in other countries: for example, when I moved to Canada, I also had to get a medical ID card; while in the Netherlands, new residents need to formally register in their new town, regardless of nationality.

Imagine moving to a new community, and trying to understand what is expected and required, and navigate it all, in a language you don't speak very well, if at all!

At the end of 2023, Christ Church was blessed by a significant donation, which the donor stipulated should be used "for ministry to and with the Haitian community in Springfield." After consultation with the vestry, the outreach committee, and many of the agencies and organizations working with Haitians in Springfield, it seemed that one of the best ways we might use this money would be to help connect Haitians (and others) with the information that they need. And so, beginning February 25, Christ Episcopal Church will host a series of presentations called "How to Succeed in Springfield."

These presentations will be offered about once per month, throughout the spring. They will be offered on Sundays, at  $1:00 \, \text{PM} - a$  time that is convenient for working people but should not interfere with most of our

presentations will be offered in English, but our donation allows us to hire professionals to offer simultaneous translation into Creole. The presentations will be open to anyone, but obviously, we expect that they will be most useful to our newer neighbors from Haiti.

The generous donation means that we can launch this new ministry without touching our annual operating budget. It will also not affect our endowment in any way.

I hope, however, that it will be an expansion of our mission. In many ways, it fits perfectly with our existing mission statement. We will be offering our new neighbors some hospitality, including refreshments; education about Springfield's ways; and outreach, connecting with new people in our community.

Please consider joining us in this important ministry. It would be wonderful if we had additional people present on the afternoon of February 11, and subsequent "Succeed in Springfield" days, to welcome people into our hall and help them find their way. We hope to offer coffee and other beverages and have someone available to watch children while their parents attend. And, of course, we hope you will join us in praying for our new neighbors, and our new efforts to help them feel at home.
