On Being Supportive

The "We Should Do Something at Mother Stewart's" group — otherwise known as the Game Night Crew — had gathered, but not at Mother Stewarts. For a lot of reasons, we've been moving around, visiting a variety of different restaurants in Springfield. In October, we met at Los Mariachis.

"It's good to see this place so full on a Thursday night," said one.

"Yeah. I'd expect a crowd on a Friday, but this is good."

"I want them to succeed. You know, they were the first Mexican restaurant in Springfield. That was a while ago." We talked a bit about the history of the place, and the generations of people who had worked there to build it up.

Of course, our being there – filling a table, eating dinner, lingering over some beverages as we played games – all of that would help them succeed. It's one of the reasons we wanted to visit different places in Springfield for Game Night – to boost all of those businesses, to help our local entrepreneurs succeed. Because it's not enough to simply say, "that's a good company, run by good people. I want them to succeed." Sure, we can recommend a business to others. But, truly supporting means giving of time and money, giving of ourselves. And people are more likely to go to a restaurant if they are invited by people they know.

All of that is true for the Church, too.

Our stewardship campaign this year will run throughout the month of November. The theme is "Sowing the Seeds for Growth." This was intentionally chosen. One of the things we heard consistently throughout our visioning process last year was that most parishioners hoped our parish would grow, become more vibrant, and offer more things to attract different people to the church. We've started a number of initiatives in the last year to follow up on those suggestions. But it takes more than just ideas.

Our two campaign goals will help sow more seeds and more firmly root the seeds that have already taken hold. For example, the financial goal of \$160,000 will enable us to retain the services of a nursery attendant every Sunday, making our church a welcoming place for families with small children, something we didn't have last year. It will also allow us to expand our use of a livestream technician on Sundays, so that those who are ill at home can continue to join us for virtual services each week even when Kelly is leading Children's Chapel.

Our other goal is to increase the number of pledging units in our parish. Many folks pledge every year, but for those newer to the Episcopal Church, the idea of pledging can be strange. Simply put, a pledge is a promise to pay a certain amount in a given year. It doesn't have to be paid all at once. A pledge allows us to plan for the coming year. Just as many of us make a budget based on the promise we have of earned income or Social Security benefits, our parish strives to budget based in part on the promises we have from our pledgers. This helps us know what we can afford without dipping too much into our savings.

But it tells us more than just that. As Dan McGregor, a member of this year's Stewardship Committee, pointed out, "Support is the sign of a healthy parish." The Game Night Crew was happy to see a local restaurant doing good business on a Thursday night because it was a sign that the business was healthy. Likewise, if we meet our stewardship goals, it will be a sign that we are a healthy parish. It will show that we support what we are doing, and we care enough to give of our hard-earned money to make it succeed.

While our stewardship campaign is focused on money and pledges, we need to do a bit more. We need to think about giving of our time and talent. Consider this: if we walked into a restaurant, and didn't see anyone sitting at the tables, we might think twice about staying for dinner. Even if the restaurant was making ends

meet through a takeout or delivery business, it wouldn't seem very welcoming or trustworthy. We'd wonder why nobody was there, and we might turn around and go. Likewise, an empty church or parish hall isn't very welcoming. It feels cold, or tired. Even online, people sometimes look at our livestream and ask, "where is everyone? This is sad." Likewise, a gathering over food doesn't feel as hospitable if there aren't many people there. If we want Christ Church to thrive and grow, we need to start showing up to help it seem thriving to those visiting or watching for the first time. Like supporting a restaurant, the best way to get people to come is to invite them to join you at some event at church, to be that familiar face as they walk in the door.

At some point in the next year or two, we will need to make some more decisions. Because if we want to grow, we will need more tangible forms of support. We will need folks to help teach Sunday School, or volunteer in the nursery. We will need folks to help cook meals or help prepare worship each Sunday. At the moment, we do all these things with a combination of volunteers and staff. But, as we sow the seeds for growth, we will need more of both. We will need to contribute our talents to build up our programs, or we will need to pay others to share their talents in a professional capacity.

We are incredibly blessed. We have a parish with a rich history, deep liturgy, and established tradition of welcoming all with the love of God. God has also blessed us as individuals, some with financial assets, others with talents like creativity or administrative gifts. But God didn't give us these blessings for our own use. They are richer when they are shared in support of a cause we believe in. Just as we scatter our favorite seeds each fall and spring so that we can enjoy plants and produce throughout the year, I hope you will join in our Stewardship Campaign as we Sow the Seeds for Growth.

Highlights from the September 12th, 2024 meeting. Vestry Highlights will be published after the minutes have been approved at the following month's Vestry meeting. A copy of Vestry minutes is posted on the bulletin board in the entryway of the Guild Room.

- The meeting started with a brief discussion about the recent community events, followed by concluding prayers lead by Rev. Michelle.
- Ken Bladh sent the Treasurer's report out via email. Ken stated that none of the outreach funds have been spent for 2024.
 Ken wondered if the Vestry should get more involved with Outreach spending.
- Steve Sharp reported that we have received quotes from both contractors on the fence repairs. Ken is waiting for more information from the insurance companies before we move forward on the repairs.
- Rev. Michelle has met with pastor, the Rev. Dr. Tokunbo Adelekan, and one of his lay ministers from the Rise Community Church in Miamisburg. Rise Community Church is interested in renting space at CEC from October through January. Bill Hicks moved that the Vestry accept the rental agreement draft and to have the Church Insurance review the document. Ken Bladh seconded the motion. Motion carried.
- The next Vestry meeting will be held on Thursday, November 14th, at 6 pm.

Children's Chapel Services take place twice a month. In November they will be offered on the 10th and 17th. We will meet in the Chapel on the church's lower level at the start of the 10 AM service, down the aisle from the nursery. We are using the Spark Program; it is lectionary-based and includes a fun activity page. All lessons and activities reinforce the lectionary lesson of the day. We estimate the Children's Chapel service will take 15 to 20 minutes. Then the children can go upstairs to the service or return to the nursery.
