The Episcopal Church, as part of the Anglican Communion, sometimes likes to refer to itself as a "middle ground," or *via media*, between extremes of religious thought. When the Church of England first broke from the Roman Catholic Church in the mid-16th Century, Anglican theologians sought a middle way between Lutheranism and Calvinism. Soon, it became viewed as a middle way between Puritanism and Catholicism. Over time, the phrase has been adapted to fit all kinds of theological controversies. But it helps to remember why this exists. In seminary, my dean quoted a respected theologian to say something like "we seek the *via media*, not as a mushy middle compromise between two extremes, but because that is where the greatest depth is to be found." It's like a river, the dean said, which is usually shallowest at the edges.

Full disclosure – I've looked for that quote, and never been able to find it. He said it during chapel one morning, so I couldn't really take notes at the time... But I remember it, because I've often found it true.

Much of what we do can be explained by this *via media*, or an appreciation of both/and in daily life. Take worship, for example, most Sundays we celebrate with a combination of both Word and Sacrament – recognizing the importance of hearing Scripture and interpretation (including through music) and also celebrating God's presence in Eucharist. Some days, I find I really need one, some days, the other. We try to offer both/and.

In the Episcopal Church, this *via media* also plays out in our leadership and governance. On the one hand, we believe that the Holy Spirit guides each of us. Any member of the Church – lay or ordained – can help discern where God may be calling us to minister. And, in fact, many of the best ministries have come about when individuals answered God's call to love their neighbors.

At the same time, we also recognize the need to stay grounded, and not let ourselves be too swayed by personalities or whims. One of the many reasons we have bishops is to retain our connection to the rich collection of wisdom and tradition of our Church. Bishops (and their staffs) can provide resources and guidance and keep us

from going astray. And, while they are often seen as being conservative, they can also encourage congregations to try something different. We enjoy both the ability to discern our own way, and the guidance of those with more wisdom and training.

This month, we will have the opportunity to experience the breadth of the "both/and" leadership. On February 9, Bishop White will visit our parish. Bishops are required to visit all of their parishes at least once every three years. She will spend the day with us – leading worship, preaching, and celebrating Eucharist. She will also stay for coffee hour and lead an adult forum. Among other things, she will talk about her new initiative – the College for Congregational Development – which will strengthen congregations for ministry across Southern Ohio.

Two weeks later, we will hold the annual meeting of our parish. This marks our opportunity to gather as a congregation, review the work of Christ Church, and select new leaders to guide that work for the coming years. It is our opportunity to listen to the Holy Spirit in each of us and respond to the needs of the community around us.

I've been in a fair bit of conversation with other Springfield-area clergy lately, and some of them have been confused by our ways of making decisions. The both/and nature of the Episcopal Church can make things seem complicated. But I find that they can also lead to far greater depth. I hope you will be able to experience both sides of our both/and governance this month.

Highlights from the December 2024, meeting. Vestry Highlights are published after minutes are approved at the following month's meeting. Vestry

approved at the following month's meeting. Vestry minutes are posted on the bulletin board in the entryway of the Guild Room.

- The Nominating Committee met prior to the Vestry meeting to discuss possible candidates, which caused the Vestry meeting to start twelve minutes late. The following positions need filled: Senior Warden, Jr. Warden, and three at Large Vestry members.
- The Vestry meeting began with a reading from the Gospel of John and the Collect for The Feast of St. Lucy by Rev. Michelle.
- **Treasurer's Report**-Ken stated that a detailed Treasurer's report of

- actual 2024 spending and revenue will be provided at the January Vestry meeting.
- **Jr. Warden's Report**-Steve Sharp reported that the fence is at the paint shop and should be installed in the next few weeks. Also, approximately \$55,000 of masonry work is needed for the Hollenbeck House. The Vestry will need to be thinking about these repairs in the future.
- Senior Warden: Scott reported that the Davis Video unit had to be returned to the manufacturer to replace the circuit board. It has been repaired and is on its way back to Springfield. The AED Defibrillator located in the church has an expired battery and pads. Scott ordered the replacements, but they are on backorder. As soon as they restock, he will replace them.
- The 2025 budget: After a discussion the 2025 budget was approved.
- The Rector's housing allowance was approved.

Question: What do the following items have in common? Toilet Paper, Pet Food, Cleaning Supplies, Laundry Detergent, and Personal Hygiene Products

Answer: These items are urgently needed by our Food Pantry clients, and none can be purchased with the SNAP card. We are the only Food Pantry that offers toilet paper, and arriving clients often ask if we have it that day.

The rising costs of pet food are particularly challenging for our senior clients who are on fixed incomes.

Additionally, laundry detergent, hygiene products, and cleaning supplies can be quite expensive, so clients are very grateful when we are able to distribute these items on pantry day.

A little bit about Central Christian Food Truck Ministry. Our team begins early every Thursday morning in the church kitchen preparing a hot meal to be served to those in need at the vacant lot across from the Springfield Food Pantry. Well, actually, it begins before Thursday as team members plan a menu and obtain the supplies needed for it. Our meals range from hamburgers and fries, breakfast casserole, Italian dishes to beef and noodles over mashed potatoes, and there's always a dessert, cobblers and brownies being favorites. While in the kitchen volunteers are busy cooking, down the hall in the clothing room volunteers are sorting donated clothing, blankets, towels for distribution, assembling hygiene kits and making sure there are socks, underwear, hats and gloves available.
