On Welcoming

Kelly and I have noted with joy some new tenants here at Hollenbeck house: a pair of robins have moved into a nest in the transom facing High Street. We saw them building the nest a few weeks ago. Now, I usually walk by

Hollenbeck under the watchful eye of one or the other of the pair, who hunker down and survey the neighborhood from their space.

We've been noticing some other new faces around Christ Church these last few months: new folks checking out our parish, visiting, and in some cases, asking to become members. I hope you've seen this, too – both on Sundays, and also in the Clarion, as we introduce folks in our "Have You Met Yet?" column.

Robins are quite different from most people who join churches in 2025. For one thing, robins want very little to do with us. They are not eager to shake my hand after services on Sunday, and they would be perfectly happy if we never checked up on them or invited them for coffee. For another, they found their own way quite easily, while other visitors – especially those who have not grown up in a liturgical church– might have trouble finding their way to the bathroom, or through our service. A smiling, friendly face or greeting often makes a world of difference in making a visitor feel welcome, not so much, robins.

Finally, not much has changed for robins in the last 50 years. They have always known that they need a nest to call home, and that it should be a safe place, sheltered, where they can rest. In contrast, many people today aren't sure if they want a church. Churches can seem very unsafe sometimes – though I hope Christ Church doesn't feel that way! Many people are seeking a connection to God, and to a community, but younger people, especially, wouldn't think that a church would be a place to find those things.

At our vestry retreat in March, we discussed several possible options to serve as a focus for the coming year. In the end, we opted to focus on Invite-Welcome-Connect, a framework to help parishes "move from maintenance to mission." I'm very familiar with Invite-Welcome-Connect, and I was even a presenter at the Invite-Welcome-Connect national summit in 2016.

You will be hearing more about Invite-Welcome-Connect throughout the year. We will be holding a special adult forum series about it in the fall, and I will probably mention it in sermons on a regular basis. But one of the crucial things to understand about Invite-Welcome-Connect is that it is not a one-time focus. The hope is that it will transform our entire congregation and become part of our identity. I've already begun implementing some of the things I learned through Invite-Welcome-Connect. But this isn't something just for clergy, vestry or staff. We all have a part to play in helping our parish grow through Invite-Welcome-Connect. We've already taken a great first step, by remembering to wear name tags

every Sunday. This welcoming gesture helps visitors know our names, and helps us learn the names of returning visitors, too.

Just as we all have a part to play in keeping our new robin family feeling safe, we all can help Christ Church become a parish that invites people to join our community, welcomes visitors, and connects new members to the life of the parish and the Church. I look forward to sharing these resources with you, as we work together to build up the church and fulfill our mission: to serve Christ in all people through our four pillars of hospitality, outreach, formation, and worship.

Why Do We Do That?

(An occasional column on the symbolism of our liturgy)

Last month's Why Do We Do That? discussed reverencing the cross, altar, or Sacrament when entering or walking through the church. There is one other way in which we worship with our whole bodies during the liturgy: our position for prayer and praise. Episcopalians sometimes jokingly refer to our worship as "pew aerobics:" the way we stand, kneel, and sit at various times throughout the service.

If it seems confusing, one general guide is that we sit to listen, stand to praise, and kneel to pray. Thus, at the beginning of the service, we stand for our opening hymn, which is usually a hymn of praise to God. And, many people kneel during the general confession, which is when we are trying to be humble and asking God for forgiveness.

Of course, we sometimes also confuse matters. For example, during the Eucharistic prayers, the prayer book suggests that we stand during the first half of the prayer (through the part where we sing "Hosanna in the highest") because those prayers praise God. After that song, however, the prayer book suggests that we kneel, in remembrance of Jesus's sacrifice. However, I once knew a priest who encouraged his whole congregation to kneel for all prayers during Lent and stand for them all during Easter – since that whole season is a season of praise.

In general, many people do whatever makes them feel most connected with God. Moving around reflects our belief that what you do with your body may influence your spiritual and mental attitude. There aren't any "liturgy police" to tell you what to do, so feel free to find positions of prayer and praise that mean the most to you.

Now you know why!





Highlights from the March 2025 meeting held at the Vestry retreat at Proctor Center. *Vestry Highlights are published after minutes are approved at the following month's meeting. Vestry minutes are posted on the bulletin board in the entryway of the Guild Room.*

- Rev. Michelle called the meeting to order at 1:38 PM
- Rev. Michelle proposed the following slate of individuals to serve on the finance committee for the coming year: Ted DeLong (continuing), Scott Yeazell (continuing), Dave Bingman, Rev. Michelle (ex-officio), Ken Bladh (ex-officio), and Dan McGregor (ex-officio). All had accepted the nomination. Dan McGregor moved that this slate be accepted. Ken Bladh seconded. The motion carried.
- Ken Bladh presented the treasurer's report to the vestry. This included a copy of a list of suggested improvements to our buildings and procedures which our insurance company had

recommended, as well as the financial report for January and February.

- Much of the time during the vestry retreat had been devoted to considering various options for a "focus" for the coming year. Possibilities included continuing a "deep dive" into the visioning the parish had done in the fall of 2023, parish involvement in the College for Congregational Development; and parish-wide work with Invite-Welcome-Connect. After sampling and exploring these various options, the vestry, guided by the vision that emerged from our 2023 visioning exercise, voted to use the principles and materials from Invite-Welcome-Connect for the year. The vestry authorized Rev. Michelle to register the church for Invite-Welcome-Connect online. The vestry also indicated that it hoped Christ Church would be able to participate in the College for Congregational Development in the future, but authorized Rev. Michelle to withdraw our application and the places we had reserved for this summer's session.
- The vestry then moved to the chapel at Procter Center for a concluding Eucharist, and adjourned at 2:40 PM

In July, a pickup truck collided with the fence that separates the Christ Church property from the sidewalk. The truck struck the fence diagonally and with significant force, damaging fencing sections along High Street and Linden. With patience and diligence from the Wardens, Sexton, and Treasurer, who worked with contractors and insurance companies, the fence is now repaired! Thank you!



What a gorgeous day! We thank the volunteers for all their hard work! The first car arrived at 5:30 AM, and the first walker arrived just before 6 AM! We served 409 individuals, including 29 new clients. Clients were offered a variety of items, including chicken, hamburger, sausage, canned chicken, peanut butter, eggs, cereal, Goldfish and Cheez-It crackers, canned goods, and produce, as well as extras like toilet paper, pet food, cleaning supplies, and toiletries. A few were happy to get baby formula!

We also welcomed some visitors from Second Harvest, who were impressed with how smoothly our process works. So, again, thank you, and thank you to Angus who facilitated this visit. Also, thanks to everyone who helped unload the extra truck this month!

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Outreach Committee Report

Outreach Committee is delighted to share our progress and partnerships with Clark County nonprofit ministries. From our \$16,000 budget for 2025, to date we have funded seven ministries totaling \$6,425: Covenant Freedom School, Greater Springfield Association of Fundraising Professionals, H.O.P.E., Jefferson Street Oasis Garden, Partners in Ministries in Liberia, Springfield Farmer's Market, and Springfield Promise Neighborhood.

Jefferson Street Oasis (JSO)'s mission is to "address food insecurity that affects residents of Springfield by providing garden plots and programs that promote health and wellness." Started in 2012, four plots have grown to 100 with over 100 participants. JSO is a unique allotment-style community vegetable garden, free to use for participants and offering food classes, a children's garden, a poultry program, and community events.

JSO's note from Terry Fredrich, General Manager, states: "We are sincerely grateful and thankful for your support. Community pride and fellowship is cultured at JSO gardens with 75% of participants from South Springfield. Open to anyone, tours are available."

Outreach is supporting new and previously funded nonprofits. We have an online application available on CEC's website. If you have interest in joining the Outreach Committee, contact Fred Bartenstein, Linda Butler, or other members. Our next ZOOM meeting is July 23rd, 7-8:30 p.m.
